

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PARSHAT RE'EH

"See I put before you today blessing and a curse" (26:1). "Hear O'Israel The L-rd is our G-d, The L-rd is One" (Sefer Devarim). "You should know today and return it to your heart that Hashem is G-d in the heavens above and on the earth below. There is no other" (Devarim).

"The distance between the mind and the heart is greater than the distance between the sun and the earth" (Rabbi Yisrael Salanter). The Gemara of Rosh Hashanah states: "Hearing is not comparable to seeing."

What is the difference between the way we learn with our ears and the way we learn with our eyes? We see that sometimes the Torah Hakedosha asks that we "LISTEN" and sometimes that we "LOOK." We know that the Torah Hakedoshah is read and heard. There is an Oral and a Written Torah. What is the Difference?

Imagine that you hear a disastrous news report where hundreds of thousands of people are swept away by a giant tidal wave. The reports are gruesome. You arrive home and begin to share the horrible news with your spouse as you bring dinner to the table. You take a bite from the delicious food and request salt,

ketchup and a napkin, all the while sprinkling the report like a spice on your dinner table.

Sure, you are in pain. You are grieving and anguishing while imagining the pain of the last moments, the horror of the event and its devastating aftermath.

You decide to skip desert that night as a sign of solidarity and solace for the victims and their families. The following night you are hurrying home from an appointment and about to make the last turn before coming down your block. You can almost smell the dinner and you are starved.

Suddenly, a small dog rushes into the street and you have no time to react. You see the whole thing. You hear the whelp upon impact.

Looking in the rear view mirror you slow down. The dog is now on the side of the road twitching and you wonder what can be done. Suddenly a big Truck that had been trailing behind you finishes off your issue. You pull your car slowly into the driveway and slink up the steps. You slowly open the front door where you are met by your wife who exclaims with exuberance, "Guess what I have for dinner tonight dear; your favorite, HOT DOGS!" You excuse

yourself and go to bed early without a word!

What happened here? Do we care more about a dog than we do about one hundred thousand people? One night we can eat, discuss and pour the ketchup liberally and the next night we are ill from the tragedy of the dog!?

The answer is: one event we heard about and the other we witnessed with our own eyes. We do not always act upon what we know but what we feel.

Knowledge is like having food in the freezer. Feeling is like putting a steak on the fire. The advantage of knowledge is that it remains with us longer. We will recall years later the event of the tidal wave, its date and details. The dog hurts for a day or two and then we went back to life.

Through listening we gain knowledge and information through vision and imagination we gain motivation. When a driver is caught driving drunk he is forced to watch vivid films of human tragedy to sober his reckless ways.

Therefore, the Torah after filling our freezer with knowledge by shouting endlessly "Hear O' Israel"... now demands that we stoke the fire of vision. "Knowing today"... is one project but engaging the heart is another.

Perhaps we can now appreciate the famous Mishnah in Pirkei Avot that states: "Eizehu chacham? Ha'roeh et ha'nolad - who is wise? He who sees what will be born; the future."

Not only does he anticipate what will be, but he envisions with his mind's eye the consequences of his actions.

As an exercise, try writing an action or behavior that you would either like to adopt or reject but you are having difficulty getting started. Write down what pain or cost is involved with this action. Then write briefly how you would feel if you did this good thing for the next 5, 10, or 20 years. How would you feel if this negative trait persisted? Create a detailed picture of the pain and pleasure of the foreseeable future and you are counted amongst the wise.

THE KOSHER LOTTERY

Some people consider lotteries, "treif," - an activity no better than gambling. Others think this is an opportunity for Hashem to bestow some money on them. Some of us dream about what we will do with the money if we won. The following story told over by Rabbi Yechiel Spero is about a form of a lottery that happened in a Midwestern city. It shows the unique togetherness of Am Yisrael.

Chaim Ginsburg had undergone a kidney transplant. However, during the weeks after surgery, he experienced traumatic symptoms. He sensed that the transplant was not successful. He was in renal failure and once again had to begin dialysis treatments. He spent his days and nights hooked up to machines.

The doctors told him that in order to survive he would need yet another transplant. He felt that he would not be able to live long in this situation and he became desperate for a lifesaving intervention. He vividly remembered the first surgery and the enormous toll it took on him and his family. And now he was going to have to go through this all over again?

There was no donor among his close relatives. Therefore he became a "number" on a very long waiting list. The situation was brought to the attention of the Rabanim of the city who decided to make a dramatic appeal to save his life. This was a matter of pikuach nefesh.

That Shabbat appeals were made in every shul in the city. But it was not for money. It was for something else that was far more valuable. They asked for a donor to come forward and donate his kidney! The response was immediate. Five men and women volunteered. These volunteers went through extensive examinations and after all the medical tests, three finalists remained.

One of the three was eager to have this mitzvah so he approached the other two and with an unforgettable proposition he said, "Please let me be the donor and I will give you the reward of the mitzvah I am earning."

He was politely rejected. Think about it for a moment. It is one thing to build up the courage to donate your kidney, because you know that the mitzvah of saving another's life is paramount. The Genara of Sanhedrin states: "Kol ha'mekayem nefesh achat mi'Yisrael, maaleh alav ha'katuv, ke'ilu kiyem olam maleh - whoever upholds one Jewish soul, The Torah considers it as if he upheld the entire world."

This young man was prepared to give up that reward. He just wanted to save another Jew's life - because he cared. One of the Rabbi's called the three potential donors together and asked if anyone wanted to back out. When they all refused, he decided that the only way to determine who should be the donor was through a lottery.

This was not a lottery for millions of dollars. It was going to be worth much more than that. It would decide who would merit to save another Jew's life. The Rav chose a number and asked the men to guess the number and whoever was closest to that number would merit the chance to save a life. One of the volunteers obviously won the lotter and saved Chaim's life. But in a deeper sense, it is safe to say that in this lottery - everybody was a winner. Now stop and think about the trivial issues that break families and friends apart. Very often, arguments are about money and honor. Each side feels shortchanged. If only they would win the lottery...
