Sukkot Simchat Torah Hoshanah Rabah

ONE MOMENT LEFT Hoshanah Rabah

We are now entering the days of Sukkot and with it, entering the confines of Hashem's Shechinah Kedoshah. Sukkot is the holiday of joy and celebration. It is also the time to do teshuvah from love.

Imagine a child who does not show respect to his parents. Regardless of his behavior, the child still expects his parents to provide for him, care for him and protect him - even though he is disrespectful towards them. Can we imagine the pain a father experiences as the child keeps asking for more and more?

And yet, the father knows how much he loves his child and he gives him an opportunity to say "I'm sorry." As long as the child is willing to apologize, the father is not only willing to forgive him, but he also wishes to provide him everything that he asks for. He tells his child, "I'm giving you until the count of ten to say that you are sorry."

The father begins to count, "One... two... three..." As the seconds tick by, the child shows no sign of regret. He is unwilling to bend or to surrender. "Five... six... seven..."

The father continues to count, hoping the child will soon apologize. By the time he reaches number eight, he realizes that the child is not going to regret his behavior or say "I'm sorry."

What will he do now?

He has compassion for his child and repeats the number 8 over and over again, hoping that maybe, just maybe, those few prolonged seconds will enable his child to come to his senses and apologize to his father for his misbehavior.

The father does not wish to punish his child. He would rather provide him with all the wonderful things the child could want. The problem is, that his child will not budge! Left with no choice, he moves on to the next number and continues to count, "Nine..."

Again, he repeats this number over and over, hoping that the son will finally break and say "I'm sorry."

What is the nimshal of this poignant parable?

Hashem is the Father who demonstrates an enormous amount of patience for the misbehaving child - Bnei Yisrael. He began counting at the beginning of Elul and hoped we would apologize for our actions. But all we did was ask for more. We expected more from our Father. Yet some of us refused to admit or acknowledge that we have mistreated him and disrespected Him.

Hashem continued to count through the Yamim Ha'noraim. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kipur have passed and still, there is nothing.

Finally, Hoshanah Rabah approaches, the final day we can receive forgiveness. Hashem is now ready to count to ten. He waited and waited. After stalling time and time again, we are now at the end of the line. This is Hoshanah Rabah - our last opportunity.

But Hoshanah Rabah is also the chance for a great salvation. There are so many who have made the most of those last moments. *"Yesh koneh olamo be'sha'ah achat* - there are those who acquire their portion in the World to Come in one moment" (Gemara of Avodah Zara 10b).

Sha'ah means a moment; but it also has the same root as the word, *"sha'ah"* which means "wanted." *"Ve'el Kayin ve'el minchato lo sha'ah* - But to Kayin and to his offering He did not turn" (Breishit 4:5).

According to the Targum Yonatan (a"h), this means that Hashem did not **want** Kayin's korban.

The Sefat Emet (a"h) notes that this is the secret of Hoshanah Rabah. At the root of the words *"Hoshah na"* - is *"sha'ah."* If we really want to change, then even at this final moment we can do so. Through that change, we can acquire a share in the World to Come.

We will cry out *"Hoshah na"* - 44 times throughout the tefilah of Hoshanot on Hoshanah Rabah. We hope that these 44 cries will enable us to achieve the verdict of LIFE!

Rav Tzvi Mayer Silverberg finds an allusion to this in the words *"Be'damayich chayi* - In your blood, live!" (Yechezkel 16:6).

The word "dam - b7" (blood), has the numerical value of 44. The 44 cries of Hoshanah Rabah will assist us to merit life. With each cry, we search deeper and deeper into our souls; and we have the ability to find the "sha'ah," the will and the precise moment where change will occur, where we will ask Hashem to forgive us.

We should not worry and instead should feel happy and confident.

There is yet another name for Hoshanah Rabah - Yom Ha'aravah. It is the day when we take the aravah, the willow branch that has neither taste or smell alluding to our lack of mitzvot and Torah learning - and we hold it in our hands and walk around the bimah. We march proudly because it is all that we have. The Magid of Chernobyl (a"h) once commented that there is a minhag on Hoshanah Rabah to remove the rings from the Lulav and walk around the bimah. The Jewish nation can be compared to a young maiden, with no ring yet. And it is a sad state that the young maiden has nothing; no dress for the wedding, no money for a dowry, no food or caterer. She is poor and desperate.

The young maiden turns to Hashem and says, "Ribono Shel Olam, how can You possibly say 'no' to someone as desperate as I am?"

This is what Am Yisrael who are compared to the young maiden must ask Hashem. "Hashem, how can you say 'no' to Your children, when we are so desperate?"

The shape of the aravah reminds us of lips. Rav Shimshon Pincus (a"h) states that the aravah symbolizes the kiss we receive from Hashem. Although we are not tzadikim but merely baalei teshuvah with minimal mitzvot and maasim tovim - but we also know that *"Be'makom she'baalei teshuvah omdim, tzadikim gemurim einam omdim* - in the place where baalei teshuvah stand, complete tzadikim do not stand" (Gemara of Berachot 34b).

We ask Hashem for a kiss in our tefilah, "U'tenashkeinu mi'neshikot Picha - kiss us with the kisses of Your mouth."

Although it is difficult to fully understand what his "kiss" really means - one thing is quite clear - Bore Olam loves us. Let me tell you a story that explains this idea.

During World War II, the Nazis (yimach shemam), marched through Poland and murdered three million Jews. An elderly Jew stood with his Talit and Tefilin davening. He could not help but hear the loud screams of the Nazi soldiers ordering helpless Jews to evacuate the Warsaw Ghetto.

Suddenly, the door to his apartment burst open and the Nazi guards grabbed this frail old man. They ripped off his Talit and beat him with his Tefilin. Then they grabbed him by the head and ripped out his beard.

This holy Jew lay there in a pool of blood as they kicked him with their

metal-tipped boots and trampled upon his broken body. Then they laughed, leaving him there for dead.

Somehow, he managed to scrape together some of the hairs that were scattered all over the floor. He held them in his hand and lifted them up. And in one of the most touching tefilot ever recited he began to cry, *"Hoshah na, merutat lechi, hoshah na-* Please save, plucked of cheek, please save!"

We are battered, beaten and weak; and we are running out of time. But Bore Olam, we are Yours and we love You. We want to come home.

As the moments tick away and the door is closing, we ask You to please take us back... please!"

May this Chag Ha'Sukkot awaken in you the neshamah that longs to connect to '\n. May you be zocheh to new and positive beginnings that will lead to simchah, ahavah and dveykut la'Bore. May the walls of your Sukah keep you protected and elevate you so that you can reach a level of teshuvah me'ahavah. And with that proceed into the coming year with a clean slate, with optimism and an encouraging attitude.

I want to wish you all a chag sameach, a pitka tovah and a year of simchah, ahavah and the final geulah amen ken yehi ratzon.

An Interesting Message From The Founder Of Apple - Steve Jobs

Apple Founder Steve Jobs left behind a deathbed essay about how the "non-stop pursuit of wealth will only turn a person into a twisted being, just like me."

In November 2015, a rumor began circulating on social media that when Apple co-founder Steve Jobs passed at away at age 56 in 2011, he left behind a deathbed essay about the meaning of life.

"I reached the pinnacle of success in the business world. In others' eyes, my life is an epitome of success. However, aside from work, I have little joy. In the end, wealth is only a fact of life that I am accustomed to. At this moment, lying on my sick bed and recalling my whole life, I realize that all the recognition and wealth that I took so much pride in, have paled and become meaningless in the face of impending death.

"In the darkness, I look at the green lights from the life supporting machines and hear the humming mechanical sounds, I can feel the breath of G-d drawing closer. Now I know, when we have accumulated sufficient wealth to last our lifetime, we should pursue other matters that are unrelated to wealth...should be something that is more important:

Perhaps relationships, perhaps art, perhaps a dream from younger days. Non-stop pursuing of wealth will only turn a person into a twisted being, just like me. G-d gave us the senses to let us feel love in everyone's heart; not the illusions brought about by wealth. The wealth I have won in my life I cannot

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THINKING INSIDE THE BOX

What is a Sukah? I think some could offer a technical definition or an instruction manual for constructing it, but what is a Sukah? In order to understand a thing well, we are advised to visit the first time it is mentioned in the Torah. Where is the idea of a "Sukah" first mentioned in the Torah Ha'kedoshah?

After surviving a threatening confrontation with his arch enemy Esav, the Torah states the following: *"And on that day Esav returned on his way to Seir and Yaakov traveled to Sukot and built for himself a house and for his cattle he made Sukot therefore the name of the place is called Sukot"* (Breishit 33:16-17).

The pasuk is a bit strange. Yaakov Avinu (a"h) built himself a house but because he made Sukot for his cattle, the place he traveled to become known as, "Sukot"? Is this reason enough to name a place?

The Or Ha'Chaim Ha'kadosh (a"h) answers: "Perhaps because he did something new by showing his compassion for the cattle...that he did something that no one had done previously, that he prepared a Sukah - a shelter for animals. It was that novelty that caused that the place should be called so."

This may help us gain an insight into the essence of our Sukot, the ones we dwell in for seven days.

After a near head on collision between two super-powers, the Torah depicts Esav going back home to his old predictable ways. Yaakov Avinu, however, did something beyond the norm, outside his home. He did not walk away from his brush with death the same as he entered. Nor did he become bitter from the experience.

Instead, we see that he became better. The symbol that improvement was his innovation in creating an expanded arena for compassion in the universe - is the Sukah!

After the life and death surgery of the "Yamim Ha'noraim," a Sukah, like a clean parchment or canvas, becomes a place where, everyone can express some renewed sense of gratitude or idealism in an individual way. The inner world of each Sukah, like each person, is decorated differently.

Some hang natural fruits and vegetables and some display the seven fruits that Eretz Yisrael is praised with. There are Sukot that are covered with pictures of Talmidei Chachamim and there are those that are busy with the art projects of our children.

Many Sukot have some reminder of Yerushalayim while some have dangling mitzvah artifacts such as Shofarot, Menorahs and Kidush Cups etc. Some Sukot have uplifting pesukim from Tanach - while the Ushpizin are the invited guests that we bestow the most honorable of mention in this real Hall of Fame. Some Sukot are simply decorated with the faces of happy children and parents eating and singing together with guests and friends.

A Sukah is not only a place for artistic expression but rather a space that holds a newly harvested produce of inspiration and idealism that we will be nourished from for a whole year. A Sukah is a serious and holy domain with limitless possibilities and so are we when we exit the ordinary and begin thinking **inside the box**.

Hashem sees to it that we begin the year with mitzvot, with the project of the Sukah, with guests in our Sukah, with tefilot in the Sukah. And if we take advantage of the Holiness of the Sukah and use it as a means of attaining spiritual elevation and closeness to Hashem, then the holy light that shines forth from the Sukah and into our neshamot, will continue to shine down upon us throughout the rest of the year.
